FROM PASTOR LISA

Music—That's one thing Faith Lutheran does well, isn't it? Adult Choir, Bells, Praise Band, Congregational Singing. I've never met a congregation that could sing so many different liturgies so well. Sometimes, when I dream about how God might use this congregation, I dream about expanding this music program to include more youth choirs. If music is a strength of Faith's, why not work with that strength?

The young children sing during Sunday School and occasionally during worship, and that's great! But what about the middle school students? Imagine a 6th through 8th grade choir singing for worship and even leading parts of the liturgy such as the Kyrie or the Psalm. How about a middle school bell choir! What a wonderful opportunity this would be for young people who enjoy music and want to offer their time and talent to Church and to God.

We want youth to stick around after they're confirmed. In order to do that, we need to give them ways to be of use here. Ways that fit their God-given gifts and that reflect their own interests. Music could be one way of doing this. Not every kid wants to sing or play bells, but I believe enough do to make a go of this. Of course, we would need someone to direct these new choirs. And that someone would probably have to be paid....

Everything worth doing is going to cost us something, whether that cost come in the form of money or time or energy. I think expanding the music program to include youth is worth the investment. More kids will find ways to give of themselves to Church and God. What's more, the community will begin to see Faith as the place to be if you want to worship God and give of yourselves through music.

Faith could even become a magnet for people who would like to see their children involved in worship through music. I have a friend in California who hadn't been to church in years. Her daughter and husband hadn't even been baptized. When they decided to give church a try, they chose one that had a strong music emphasis because their young, teenage daughter was musically inclined.

That was maybe six years ago. My friend has been on the call committee; her husband has been on council; their daughter sings in the choir and has led music for Vacation Bible School. They are an important part of that congregation, and that congregation is an important part of their lives. And they chose that congregation because their daughter likes music.

He said: "I have no optimism." And then he said: But, I have not lost hope."

Pastor Mitri Reheb, Christmas Lutheran Church in Bethlehem said this to us just a couple of weeks ago while reflecting on the Israeli invasion of Gaza. "If it can be done there, it can be done anywhere. Soon it may be us." He said that too. "We do not know where it will be next." He spoke with a sad kind of matter-of-factness in his voice accented by a very present smile that reached from his face to our hearts.

Optimism. Hope. What's the difference?

There is gospel in this paradox. Even-especially in despair, in loss and fear, we find hope alive. Gospel!

Against the backdrop of all the despair and the loss and the fear, Mitri told us this story about his little congregation where, without visitors, without guests, without a special event that draws others, there are only a handful in the pews. Two hundred members, but they reach out to 60,000 people every year!

"Not many years ago" he told us, "we were dying. People were complaining that we are only a small church and we are losing members. People are leaving the land, giving up, losing hope."

Here is what he told us about their story: "Too many have the assumptions that to be a small church is a threat-that is not true. There is a lot of potential for a small church. A small church has time to reach out and not just look inside itself."

And so at first there was a great deal of resistance. The people wanted to protect themselves, stay the same, hold on. (Can you imagine that?) The congregation was not sure it wanted to take the risk. It lacked a mission for the sake of others. But look what has happened. In 1995 there was a staff of four. In 2009 there is a staff of 100. The congregation grabbed hold of a vision that was filled with hope born out of this one commitment: "that *they* may have life and have it abundantly." Today the congregation has created and maintains a school, a conference center (the International Center of Bethlehem), a Health and Wellness Center that cares for 10,000 patients a year, the first Lutheran College in the Middle East, a Guest House and Community Restaurant. A small congregation has become the third largest public employer in the Bethlehem region. Hope.

In 2002 when Israel's mighty army laid siege to Bethlehem and destroyed much of the church building the congregation said this: "Destruction may be...Continuity shall be..." The vision held them to the promise of the Gospel: "that they may have life and have it

abundantly." There is much that I could tell you about the recent Bishop's Academy to Palestine and Israel and indeed I will take other opportunities to do so. But this is the story I want to tell you right now. It is this story of no optimism, but much hope. It is the Gospel story.

The work of that little church in Bethlehem bears witness to this: If we only look inside we cannot reach outside. It is a model for us, it teaches us this; that the church is not about surviving but it is about thriving. It challenges us to believe this: if it can be done there, it can be done anywhere in the world...certainly in southern Wisconsin.

"I do not have optimism, but I do have hope" Mitri repeated time and time again. "We are headed to full apartheid here...this is where we are headed, don't be fooled. Tomorrow will be worse than today. So do as Luther taught us, 'plant trees of hope.'"

For Christ's sake and for our sake and for the world's sake, for your own community's sake and your neighborhood's sake, your congregation's sake where ever you find loss of optimism, or not optimism at all, do not lose hope. Give them the Gospel and then challenge them to trust it.

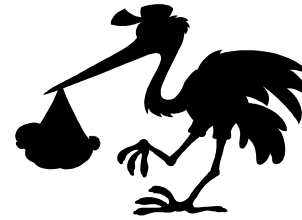

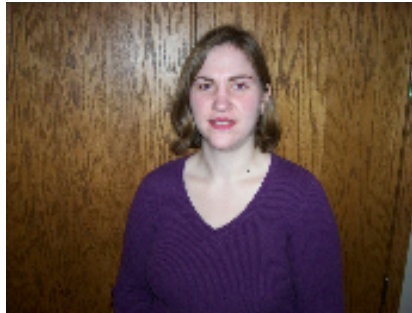

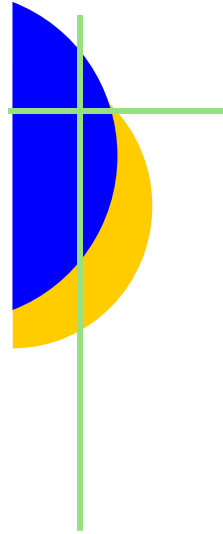

There are lots of ways to help out. Many of these opportunities don't take training or even skills. Mostly what is needed is a caring heart and a little bit of time. There are many existing programs in which we can participate, such as:

Mentor Program: This is not an academic program but rather an opportunity to spend time with a child as a caring adult, who is willing to listen.

Tutor Program: For one hour a week, you can help a student with basic math or help a number of students practice their "sight" words (words that they are memorizing).

Rock 'n Read: This program comes with 2-3 hours of training and asks that you be willing to read to a student for 15 minutes a day, 4 days a week.

Lunch Room Assistant: There are already supervisors on duty in the lunchroom, but they need people who can visit with the children, help them open their milk or ketchup packets, and simply be a positive, non-disciplinarian presence during lunch.

Playground Assistant: Again, the supervising adults are already on duty, but you can be available to talk or play with children who desire adult attention.

Guest Reader: Volunteer to read in the classroom.

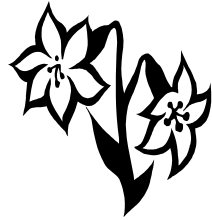
Small Group Helpers: Spend time with small groups of students, working on projects or practicing skills.

Clerical Tasks: Help out in the office or classroom by making dye cuts, cutting out pictures, etc.

If none of that speaks to you, we have another idea: a Clothes and Supply Closet. You can bring to the school office new or gently used items, such as: school supplies, backpacks, winter gear, sneakers, and jackets. These items will be available whenever teachers or staff see a child in need.

What we really need, however, is someone to keep the closet tidy. Is there someone from Faith, who could, perhaps once a week, straighten the closet and look to see what items might need to be replenished? Then we could advertise those needs at Faith.

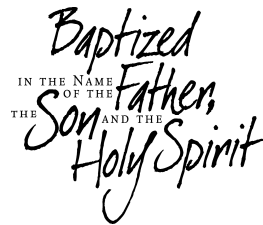

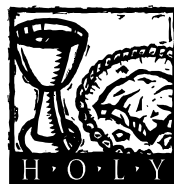
